State Contractor Contribution Bans

Connecticut General Statutes § 9-612 (g) (2) (A) & (B), provide in part that no *state contractor, prospective state contractor, principal of a state contractor or principal of a prospective state contractor*, with regard to a *state contract or state contract solicitation* with or from the *General Assembly, Executive or a quasi public agency or a lobbyist, or a principal of a lobbyist or a principal of a state public administration contractor*, shall make a contribution to a party committee.

Lobbyist Contribution Limit

Connecticut General Statutes § 9-610 (g), as amended by P. A. 10-1 provides in part that no communication lobbyist or member of the immediate family of a communication lobbyist shall make a contribution or contributions to, or for the benefit of . . . a party committee in excess of one hundred dollars.

"Public Officer" Exemption

Place Note: The state contractor contribution bans do not apply to a *principal of state contractor or prospective state contractor* who is an *elected public official*. See General Statutes § 9-612 (g) (4), as amended by P.A. 08-2. Likewise, the lobbyist contribution limit does not apply to a *spouse or dependent child* of a communication lobbyist who is an *elected public official*. See General Statutes § 9-610 (g), as amended by P. A. 10-1.

Definition of Terms

“Party committee”: a state central committee or a town committee. See General Statutes § 9-601 (2).

“State contractor”: an agreement or contract with the state or any state agency or any quasi-public agency, let through a procurement process or otherwise, having a value of fifty thousand dollars or more, or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of one hundred thousand dollars or more in a calendar year; (ii) the rendition of services; (iii) the furnishing of any goods, material, supplies, equipment or any items of any kind; (iii) the performance of any construction or maintenance work; (iv) the performance of any other work; or (v) a grant, loan or loan guarantee. “State contractor” does not include any agreement or contract with the state, any state agency, or any quasi-public agency, that is exclusively federally funded, an education loan or a loan to an individual for other than commercial purposes. See General Statutes § 9-612 (g) (1) (C).

“State contractor”: a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that (i) submits a response to a state contract solicitation by the state, a quasi-public agency or any other political subdivision of the state, or (ii) holds a valid registration certificate issued by the Commissioner of Administrative Services under section 4a-100 of the general statutes. “State contractor” does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee or legislative branch of the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person’s capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee. See General Statutes § 9-612 (g) (1) (D).

“Prospective state contractor”: a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that (i) submits a response to a state contract solicitation by the state, a quasi-public agency or any other political subdivision of the state, or (ii) holds a valid registration certificate issued by the Commissioner of Administrative Services under section 4a-100 of the general statutes. “Prospective state contractor” does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee or legislative branch of the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person’s capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee. See General Statutes § 9-612 (g) (1) (E).

“Principal of a state contractor or prospective state contractor”: (i) an individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is not a business entity, or if a state contractor or prospective state contractor has no such officer, then the officer who duly possesses comparable powers and duties; (ii) an officer or an employee of any state contractor or prospective state contractor who has managerial or discretionary powers or duties; (iii) a spouse or a dependent child who is eighteen years of age or older of an individual described in (i), (ii), (iii), or (v). See General Statutes § 9-612 (g) (1) (F).

“Communication lobbyist”: an individual or entity that is registered with the Office of State Ethics and the term “communication lobbyist” is defined by the Office of State Ethics. A communication lobbyist reserves the right to agree to receive two thousand dollars or more in a calendar year by the lobbyist. See General Statutes § 1-91 (7) & (7a).

“Immediate family” means: The spouse or a dependent child of an individual. See General Statutes § 9-601 (24). Please note, “Spouse” as used above includes partners in a civil union pursuant to General Statutes § 46b-38a, et al.

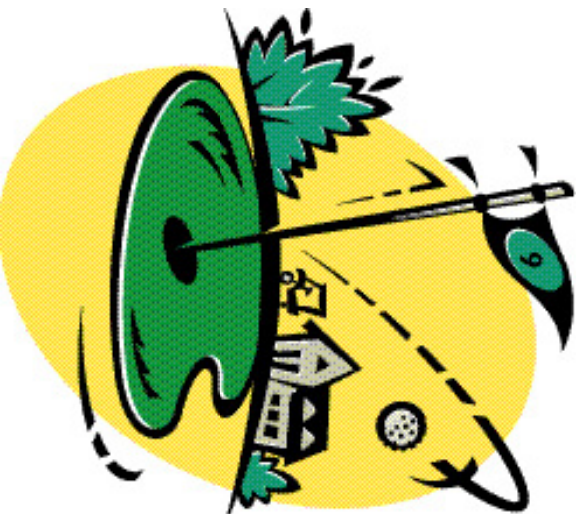
“Dependent child” means: a child residing in an individual’s household who may legally be claimed as a dependent on the federal income tax return of such individual. See General Statutes § 9-612 (g) (1) (G).

State Contractor Contribution Bans

Connecticut General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (2) (A) & (B) provide in part that no *state contractor, prospective state contractor, principal of a state contractor or principal of a prospective state contractor*, with regard to a *state contract or state contract solicitation* with or from the **General Assembly, Executive Branch**, or a *quasi public agency* or a *holder*, or a *principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate*, shall make a contribution to a **party committee**.

\$100 Lobbyist Contribution Limit

Connecticut General Statutes § 9-610 (g) provides in part that no communicator lobbyist or member of the immediate family of a communicator lobbyist shall make a contribution or contributions to, or for the benefit of a party committee **in excess of one hundred dollars**.

“Public Official” Exemption

Please Note: The state contractor contribution bans do not apply to a *principal of a state contractor or prospective state contractor* who is an **elected public official**. See General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (4). Likewise, the communicator lobbyist contribution limit does not apply to a *spouse or dependent child* of a communicator lobbyist who is an **elected public official**. See General Statutes § 9-610 (j).

Definition of Terms

“Party committee”: a state central committee or a town committee. See General Statutes § 9-601 (2).

“Individual contributor”: a human being, a sole proprietorship, or a professional service corporation organized under chapter 594a and owned by a single human being. A sole proprietorship is a business in which one human being owns all the assets, owes all the liabilities, and operates in his or her personal capacity. Any other type of business is not permitted to make a contribution, including LLCs. See General Statutes § 9-601 (9).

“State contract”: an agreement or contract with the state or any state agency or any quasi-public agency, let through a procurement process or otherwise, having a value of \$50,000 or more, or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of \$100,000 or more in a calendar year, for (i) the rendition of services, (ii) the furnishing of any goods, material, supplies, equipment or any items of any kind, (iii) the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work, (iv) the acquisition, sale or lease of any land or building, (v) a licensing arrangement, or (vi) a grant, loan or loan guarantee. “State contract” does not include any agreement or contract with the state, any state agency or any quasi-public agency that is exclusively federally funded, an education loan, a loan to an individual for other than commercial purposes or any agreement or contract between the state or any state agency and the United States Department of the Navy or the United States Department of Defense. See General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (C).

“State contractor”: a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that enters into a state contract. Such person, business entity or nonprofit organization shall be deemed to be a state contractor until December 31 of the year in which such contract terminates. “State contractor” does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person’s capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee. See General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (D).

“Prospective state contractor”: a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that (i) submits a response to a state contract solicitation by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, or a proposal in response to a request for proposals by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, until the contract has been entered into, or (ii) holds a valid prequalification certificate issued by the Commissioner of Administrative Services under section 4a-100. “Prospective state contractor” does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person’s capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee. See General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (E).

“Principal of a state contractor or prospective state contractor”: (i) an individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more in a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of a nonprofit organization, (ii) an individual who is employed by a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, as president, treasurer or executive vice president, (iii) an individual who is the chief executive officer of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is not a business entity, or if a state contractor or prospective state contractor has no such officer, then the officer who duly possesses comparable powers and duties, (iv) an officer or an employee of any state contractor or prospective state contractor who has managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract, or (v) the spouse or a dependent child who is eighteen years of age or older of an individual described in (i), (ii), (iii), or (iv). See General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (F).

“Communicator lobbyist”: a lobbyist who communicates directly or solicits others to communicate with an official or his staff in the legislative or executive branch of government or in a quasi-public agency for the purpose of influencing legislative or administrative action. A lobbyist, in turn, is generally defined as a person who, in lobbying and in furtherance of lobbying, makes or agrees to make expenditures, or receives or agrees to receive compensation, reimbursement, or both, and such compensation, reimbursement or expenditures are \$3,000 or more in any calendar year or the combined amount thereof is \$3,000 or more in any such calendar year. See General Statutes § 1-91 (12) & (22) (as amended by Public Act 15-15).

“Immediate family”: The spouse or a dependent child of an individual. See General Statutes § 9-601 (24).

“Dependent child”: a child residing in an individual’s household who may legally be claimed as a dependent on the federal income tax return of such individual. See General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (G).

Advertising Purchase Certification Form Enfield Republican Town Committee

Party committees may not receive advertising purchases from communicator lobbyists, immediate family members of communicator lobbyists, state contractors, prospective state contractors, or principals of state contractors or prospective state contractors. *See definitions on back for more information.*

Fundraiser Advertising Purchase

The law allows a **business entity** to purchase up to an aggregate total of **\$250** worth of advertising space each calendar year on a sign or in a program book for fundraising affairs sponsored by a party committee and not have it considered a contribution. *See* General Statutes § 9-601a (b) (10) (B). The law allows all other **persons** (including human beings, sole proprietorships, other committees, organizations (which includes labor unions), and any other legal entity of any kind but does not mean the state or any political or administrative subdivision of the state) to purchase up to an aggregate total of **\$50** worth of advertising space each calendar year on a sign or in a program book for fundraising affairs sponsored by a party committee and not have it considered a contribution. *See* General Statutes § 9-601a (b) (10) (B). Note that the law treats sole proprietorships and professional service corporations organized under chapter 594a and owned by a single human being as individuals and not as business entities, which means they may only purchase up to \$50 in advertising space each calendar year under this exception.

Definition of Terms

“Business entity”: includes the following: stock corporations, banks, insurance companies, business associations, bank associations, insurance associations, partnerships, joint ventures, private foundations, trusts or estates, corporations, and trade or professional associations which receive funds from membership dues and other sources. It does not include nonstock corporations which are not engaged in profitmaking activity. *See* General Statutes § 9-601 (8).

“Person”: includes the following: individuals, organizations, other registered committees (candidate committees, political committees, and party committees), and any other legal entity of any kind but does not mean the state or any political or administrative subdivision of the state. *See* General Statutes § 9-601 (10). “Individual,” in turn, includes human beings, sole proprietorships and professional service corporations organized under chapter 594a and owned by a single human being. *See* General Statutes § 9-601 (9). “Organization,” in turn, includes labor unions and trade or professional associations which receive their funds exclusively from membership dues. *See* General Statutes § 9-601 (7).

“State contract”: an agreement or contract with the state or any state agency or any quasi-public agency, let through a procurement process or otherwise, having a value of fifty thousand dollars or more, or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of one hundred thousand dollars or more in a calendar year, for (i) the rendition of services, (ii) the furnishing of any goods, material, supplies, equipment or any items of any kind, (iii) the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work, (iv) the acquisition, sale or lease of any land or building, (v) a licensing arrangement, or (vi) a grant, loan or loan guarantee. “State contract” does not include any agreement or contract with the state, any state agency or any quasi-public agency that is exclusively federally funded, an education loan, a loan to an individual for other than commercial purposes or any agreement or contract between the state or any state agency and the United States Department of the Navy or the United States Department of Defense. *See* General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (C).

“State contractor”: a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that enters into a state contract. Such person, business entity or nonprofit organization shall be deemed to be a state contractor until December thirty-first of the year in which such contract terminates. “State contractor” does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person’s capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee. *See* General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (D).

“Prospective state contractor”: a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that (i) submits a response to a state contract solicitation by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, or a proposal in response to a request for proposals by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, until the contract has been entered into, or (ii) holds a valid prequalification certificate issued by the Commissioner of Administrative Services under section 4a-100. “Prospective state contractor” does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person’s capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee. *See* General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (E).

“Principal of a state contractor or prospective state contractor”: (i) an individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more in a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of a nonprofit organization, (ii) an individual who is employed by a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, as president, treasurer or executive vice president, (iii) an individual who is the chief executive officer of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is not a business entity, or if a state contractor or prospective state contractor has no such officer, then the officer who duly possesses comparable powers and duties, (iv) an officer or an employee of any state contractor or prospective state contractor who has managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract, or (v) the spouse or a dependent child who is eighteen years of age or older of an individual described in (i), (ii), (iii), or (iv). *See* General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (F).

“Communicator lobbyist”: a lobbyist who communicates directly or solicits others to communicate with an official or his staff in the legislative or executive branch of government or in a quasi-public agency for the purpose of influencing legislative or administrative action. A lobbyist, in turn, is generally defined as a person who, in lobbying and in furtherance of lobbying, makes or agrees to make expenditures, or receives or agrees to receive compensation, reimbursement, or both, and such compensation, reimbursement or expenditures are \$3,000 or more in any calendar year or the combined amount thereof is \$3,000 or more in any such calendar year. *See* General Statutes § 1-91 (12) & (22) (as amended by Public Act 15-15).

“Immediate family”: the spouse or a dependent child of an individual. *See* General Statutes § 9-601 (24).

“Dependent child”: a child residing in an individual’s household who may legally be claimed as a dependent on the federal income tax return of such individual. *See* General Statutes § 9-612 (f) (1) (G).
